## Remarks by Kiya Masahiko, Ambassador of Japan to South Sudan, at the Commencement Ceremony at the University of Juba upon the awarding of Honorary Doctorate in International Relations

Japan has always been on the supporting side. Therefore, it is the South Sudanese themselves to be given the credit. To be awarded an Honorary Doctorate.

It is my sincere hope that each and every one of you, graduands, will make full use of what you have earned from the university, the country and the world, give it back to the society at large, and take the lead in building a united, peaceful and prosperous nation of South Sudan.
