And I believe that this is the biggest award for your participations in this project.

I respect your endeavour throughout the Project and wish you every success in your business. I cannot wait to see your products to be sold in Japan!!!

Secondly, I would like to thank the UNIDO team and the Salesian Sister of Don Bosco for your tireless work to empower women and youth.
